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Talking About Your Epilepsy

When you tell someone how epilepsy has touched your life, you have the opportunity to challenge any misconceptions they may have about people living with seizure disorders, teach them proper seizure first aid techniques and inform them that epilepsy is a common diagnosis affecting 1 in 100 Canadians. In other words, you are starting a conversation that can change the way they think about seizure disorders. TOP REASONS TO TELL OTHERS ABOUT YOUR EPILEPSY

- Reduce stress. You won't waste energy on protecting your secret.
- Feel more comfortable with friends, colleagues, and acquaintances by building open and honest relationships.
- You may find out that other people you know also live with epilepsy.
- Educate others and bust myths.
- Help others realize that people with epilepsy are just like everyone else.
